## From the Pastor

### *TREASURE NEW AND OLD*

And Jesus said to them, "Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old." (Matthew 13:52)

Christian faith has been around almost two thousand years. Many Christians now find themselves in a bewildering world that is increasingly secular and advocating a dizzying array of options of beliefs, values, and lifestyles. Some question if the Christian faith of their youth has any relevance in the brave new world we now find ourselves in. The church was birthed in a world that is remarkably like our own and it learned to thrive in that world. The early church has valuable lessons to teach those willing to learn. We will face the challenges of the unknown future standing on the solid foundation of Jesus Christ and two thousand years of the church's history of serving him. Coping with today's challenges will require energy, intelligence, imagination, and love.

For a time, we journey together. I am grateful for the opportunity to serve as your Interim Pastor and look forward to getting to know you and together seeking to discern God's will for this outstanding congregation.

# The First Presbyterian Church in Germantown

## Financial Mission for 2013

This is the third of several articles detailing First Church's financial commitment to Outreach and Mission.

Each year when the Church's budget is prepared there is a category labeled Outreach & Mission as part of the budget passed by the Session and communicated to the congregation. This budgeted category contains various line items including Community Grants and other mission related causes. These other mission related causes are specifically designated by the Outreach & Mission committee.

The following are the 2013 actual expenditures for the other mission related causes:

Synod	\$500

Community Outreach	\$801
<b>Total</b>	<b>\$40,040</b>

The above represent only a portion of the many ways First Church supports Outreach and Mission. July's issue of *Windows* detailed the 2013 Challenge Offerings which were \$10,768. September's issue of *Windows* detailed the 2013 Community Grants which were \$46,000. The sum of these two programs plus the above Mission budget was **\$96,808**. This represented 12.1% of our actual income for 2013.

In addition the cost of the use of our building is not included in these figures. This would include utilities, staff salaries, and wear and tear on our facility. Some of the groups that use our building without paying rent are:

## Interfaith Hospitality Network

Thank you to all the volunteers who supported the Interfaith Hospitality Network guests during this fall hosting session. The four families that we hosted included fifteen individuals who had an uneventful stay with us and will be leaving on Sunday, October 5. Many of you have donated food

including prepared meals as well as volunteering as evening and overnight hosts. Your help made a difference for these families who are dealing with the daily challenges associated with being homeless. The families have expressed their gratitude to all who have shown them hospitality their stay at FPCG.

A status report on hunger and homelessness states that homelessness can be invisible. Rather than living on the streets, people live out of a car or crowd into someone else's apartment or house before turning to a shelter. IHN is an optimal alternative for these families by providing housing in a faith centered space where participants can feel safe and cared for. Delicious meals are also provided and families have a modicum of privacy unlike the dorm-style living often experi-

enced in a city shelter. Households also receive individualized attention from an IHN social worker who manages a caseload of five families as opposed to city shelter case managers that can manage fifty or more families.

IHN will return to FPCG in April 2015. As the winter months approach, continue to pray for those who are on the edge, doing their best not to become homeless. Loss of heat or electricity can be the final straw forcing a family to abandon their residence. Thank God Germantown Avenue Crisis Ministry can help some in our community to resolve their crisis thwarting homelessness. Let us continue to pray for the homeless and vulnerable in our community and those who work daily to assist this population.

# Germantown Avenue Crisis Ministry

In a few short weeks, Thanksgiving and Christmas will be upon us. While it may seem during the holiday season that time flies, in actuality, October through December can be some of the most challenging months for social service providers assisting vulnerable families. For GACM the days seem to drag as daily countless people come to our door seeking emergency assistance in preparation for a long, cold winter. No longer can an outdoor grill or cold shower substitute for functioning utilities. During the fall, utility companies aggressive-

ly seek to turn off services before December 1<sup>st</sup> when a moratorium is in place preventing termination for most low income consumers. Whether one has fallen behind due to an unexpected household income change or a broken payment agreement, the pressure to retain heat and electricity is increased at this time of year leading more people to our door.

Additionally, families, particularly those with children, seek help for Thanksgiving and Christmas. As we do each year, GACM anticipates providing several hun-

dred holiday baskets and toys to those requesting our help. Join us by giving generously to our food cupboard and holiday drives. Your donations to the cupboard can be accepted at any time, plan to participate during our monthly Celebration Sunday collection, when our church family brings gifts of food and coins to the front of the church. The gifts are dedicated during the offering and then used by GACM and other initiatives to fight hunger in our local community and beyond. Celebration Sunday takes place the last Sunday in each month.

This training will help equip us with the ability to recognize and address subversive forms of racism that exist both intentionally out in the open and unconsciously under the radar and out of the public spotlight of our institutions, including churches, schools, and workplaces. This workshop provides the tools to better understand the causes of institutional abuse of power and to better address the abuses in every organization in which we participate.

The time commitment required for this weekend workshop is significant. Registrants are expected to attend all three days. However, participants can gain more energy, skills and life lessons than the time and energy spent. The Crossroads’ analysis of institutional racism launches us on a course of life action that, while difficult, is aligned with the Gospel and is positive, honest and hopeful.

# Fisher's Pot Pies



**CHICKEN POT PIE:** Chunks of white meat, carrot strips, round potatoes, peas and pearl onions blended in a flavorful chicken gravy and topped with a home style pastry crust. Net Wt. 16oz (1 lb.) Bake at 400F for 45 minutes, until the crust browns and the gravy bubbles.

**BEEF POT PIE:** Chunks of tender beef, carrot strips, round potatoes, peas and pearl onions blended in a hearty beef gravy topped with a home style pastry crust. Net Wt. 16oz (1 lb.) Bake at 400F for 45 minutes, until the crust browns and the gravy bubbles.

**CHICKEN BREAST AND BROCCOLI:** Whole piece of chicken breast over tender broccoli, amidst a delightful supreme sauce topped with a thin layer of parmesan and Romano cheeses. Net Wt. 14oz. Bake at 400F for 45-50 minutes, until the top lightly browns and the sauce bubbles under chicken.

**CHICKEN BREAST AND MUSHROOM FETTIUCINI:** Whole piece of chicken breast over a bed of fettuccini and covered with creamed mushrooms and topped with a thin layer of parmesan and Romano cheeses. Net Wt. 15oz. Bake at 400F for 45-50 minutes, until the top lightly browns & sauce bubbles under chicken.

**SHRIMP POT PIE:** Shrimp, diced potatoes, broccoli, corn, peas and sundried tomatoes blended with a mild creamy shrimp sauce and topped with a flaky pastry crust. Net Wt. 16oz. (1 lb.) Bake at 400F for 45 minutes, until the crust browns and the sauce bubbles.

**CHICKEN SPINACH PROVOLONE:** A breaded chicken breast placed over linguini and topped with a creamed spinach sauce and provolone cheese with an accompaniment of zucchini squash. Net Wt. 14oz. Bake at 380F for 45 minutes or microwave on high for 7-8 minutes.

**CHICKEN BREAST MANGO:** A chicken breast topped with mango sauce & placed over white & wild rice accompanied with broccoli florets. Net weight 13.25oz. Bake at 375F for 30 minutes or microwave on high for 6-7 minutes.

**CHICKEN BREAST PARMIGIANA:** A breaded chicken breast atop linguini & covered with marinara sauce and mozzarella & parmesan cheeses, accompanied with a serving of sugar snap peas. Net Wt. 16oz (1 lb.) Bake at 390 F. for 45 minutes or microwave on high for 8-9 minutes.

**ROAST TURKEY:** Roast sliced turkey breast over stuffing with a flavorful gravy. Accompanied with glazed sweet potato & green beans. Garnished with cranberries. Net Wt. 15.oz. Bake at 400F for 30 minutes or microwave on high for 9-10 minutes.

**ROAST LOIN OF PORK:** Slices of pork loin are topped with a flavorful maple barbeque sauce and served over rice. A combination of corn, black beans and red pepper accompanies with a garnish of broccoli floret. Net wt 13.5oz. Bake at 400F for 30 minutes or microwave on high for 7 minutes.

**MACARONI AU GRATIN:** Elbow macaroni combined with a flavorful sauce blending cheddar & parmesan cheeses and diced tomatoes. Topped with delicately seasoned bread crumbs combined with shredded cheddar cheese. Net Wt. 14oz. Bake at 400F for 30 minutes or microwave on high for 7-9 minutes.

**APPLE DEEP DISH:** Slices of apples, seasoned and sweetened, under a flaky pie crust. (An old-fashioned apple pie taste that is especially complimented with vanilla ice cream!) Serves two. Net Wt. 14oz. Bake at 400F for 40 minutes, the crust lightly browns with the apples bubbling.
