"Fear Not."

"Do not be afraid."

"Be anxious for nothing."

The charge to let go of anxiety and fear occurs over 300 times in the Bible, more often than any other sentiment. I think there is a reason for that.

We human beings are set up for fear. From the time of our creation, our survival instinct, lodged in our reptilian complex—the oldest part of our brain, controlling our vital functions, such as breathing, heart rate, and body temperature—calls us to fight or flee in times of stress or anxiety. Our brains are pre-programmed to act and react, in case of threat. Yet God tells us in our Holy Word to do the opposite. The question is: How?

Diana Butler Bass, author of "Grateful" and keynote speaker at the Kaleidoscope conference I recently attended, told us that science proclaims practicing gratitude stymies the reptilian brain responses. That one cannot be grateful and afraid at the same time. That when we intentionally sit in gratitude, think of the things that we are grateful for, act on those feelings of gratitude, our brain is not capable of being fearful.

We have so much to be grateful for. The love of God in Jesus Christ, the community of faith to which we belong that actively strives to practice that love and share it with others, our family and friends, and so much more. I intend to more actively practice gratitude in the days, weeks, and months ahead, and charge you to do the same. In so doing, I believe we can more faithfully and fully become the people God imagines us to be.

May it be so!

Managing Stormwater Responsibly

As everyone knows, we have had plenty of rain this year, some of it very intense. Stormwater creates serious problems for our church (which is built over a creek) and with Philadelphia's stormwater system, which is old and overloaded. Did you know that roughly 60% of our water bill is not for the water we use, but instead is a stormwater management shares over \$(000 a war2) and this charge is likely to it.



management charge--over \$6,000 a year? And this charge is likely to increase. This is a major issue for many properties in our area.

To respond to this challenge, the Property Committee and church friends have worked with an engineering firm to develop a proposal for a project to manage our stormwater. This proposal was recently accepted by the Philadelphia Water Department, which will provide a grant to pay for the cost of the project (approximately \$240,000). This is a very exciting award which will have long term benefits for both FPCG and our city. We are currently in the initial stages of the project, and expect the work to be performed in summer 2019. There will be some construction in the parking lots, and we will work with the contractors to minimize disruptions. More details on this plan will be forthcoming. Painting Anasco (excerpt)

When I was in junior high, I loved getting up on Saturday mornings to watch the Magic of Oil Painting with Bill Alexander on PBS. I watched in amazement each week as he took a canvas covered in Magic



White and transformed it into a new creation. He mixed colors with brushes and soon the canvas was covered with clouds, flowing water, rugged mountains and my favorite, happy little trees. It didn't take long before I asked my mom for my own painting supplies so I could follow along with my instructor. Of course, my mom obliged and soon I had an easel, canvases, oil paints, brushes and my very own palette where I too would mix my colors for my own masterpieces.

I never knew what "we" would paint the next week, but he knew. I simply had to follow as he guided me through every step of our creation. Mr. Alexander would often start by painting the sky followed by some water, like an ocean, lake or stream. Next, he would cut in some mountains with a special palette knife. Then he would begin to work on the trees by first by cutting in the strong tree trunks. Finally, he would use a brush I had never seen before, a fan brush, to punch in the leaves of the trees. At first glance, you might not think much of this brush. Its very shape was so different from the others in my collection. Its bristles spread out making them appear so delicate and frail. It would be very easy to underestimate the power of this brush on any canvas. And yet this fan brush was powerful and added so much beauty to the canvas in the form tree leaves, wispy clouds, snow covered mountains and light shining on any aspect of the painting.

I thought about this creative time in my life as I reflected on our trip to Puerto Rico. In the beginning, the idea of a work trip to Puerto Rico was a blank canvas. Sheila and Christian connected with The First Presbyterian Church in Anasco and presented the idea of a work trip there to help with disaster relief. They had no idea exactly what the team would do or even who would make up the team. All they knew was the burden that God placed on their hearts to serve His people who had been ignored, forgotten, or were literally unknown to so many. But God, the Master Painter, knew every aspect of the masterpiece He wanted to create. He knew that the backdrop was His beloved Puerto Rico and more specifically His children both young and old in the town of Anasco.

Some may have thought that this masterpiece in the works just needed rugged mountains, like seasoned professional contractors, and solid tree trunks such as strong, experienced adults, to complete the task. However, God knew exactly the individuals who would answer the call for this first trip and to the surprise of many, the majority of our group was comprised of families with elementary school aged children.

Each person brought their talent and most importantly their willing spirit to help in any way possible. We put aside our preconceived ideas of what we should do and allowed ourselves to be directed to the work that needed to be done. So God, in all His Glory, looked at His

palette of servants and began mixing. First, He mixed Marc, Andrea, Siena, and Emery produced the Dream Team, then He mixed me, Jason, Danielle, and Manni creating the Yellow Brick Road, and so on and so forth until all of the work groups were formed. The youth of our church worked so hard – taping, scraping, and painting all week long and as you have already heard, the trip touched and transformed their lives. God used His fan brush and dipped into the color of each child's life (Elisa, Sol, Emery, Siena, Manni, Josh, Matthew, Danielle and Jasmine) and added such beauty to the masterpiece He was creating. Their work alongside the adults on their teams made such a difference and it would not have been the same without them. In the end, it seemed very fitting that many of the projects that we worked on at the church are now spaces where food and household items are being distributed and services are provided much like our Germantown Avenue Crisis Ministry.

The last moment of the trip that I want to share happened on the Saturday before we left. It was our fun day that capped off a week of hard work. We went cave tubing and truly witnessed the beauty of God's creation. At the end of the day, we had an opportunity to jump off a cliff into the water. Some will say it was only about 10 feet high but it looked closer to 20 to me!

People started making their way up a treacherous path to the cliff. One by one they jumped: Sheila, Christian, Josh, Manni, Jasmine, Sol, Marc, and Andrea. Even Rosemary, who was first a "No," jumped in support of Siena, who was standing atop the cliff looking quite tentative. Now I was the only adult who hadn't jumped and Siena still on the top of the cliff. You must know that earlier that day, Siena had literally been my buddy, holding my hand as we hiked down what seemed to be a mile trail to where the cave tubing would start. She was there for me, she supported me, she made sure I didn't fall and I appreciated her willingness to go at my pace and ensure my safe arrival to the bottom of our path. I tried to encourage Siena from where I was standing on the shore but it was clear that I was going to have make my way up the treacherous side of the cliff (this time without Siena's assistance) to meet her literally and figuratively where she was.

Once I arrived at the top of the cliff, I talked to her. And do you know what happened next? I said, "If you jump, then I will jump." I

said to myself, *Self, did you really say that*? Yup. *Did she hear it*? Yup. Did I mean it? At the moment, absolutely Yes! But five minutes later after Siena had successfully jumped off the cliff and I was literally the last man standing, not so much. Then a flood of thoughts came into my head. I heard my daughter say, "What would Malik (my boyfriend) say?" I knew what he would say, "You got this." A few moments went by, tears began to well up in my eyes – because I'm me and it's what I do – and I heard God say, "I got you." Not "you got this," but *I got you*. After a few of these false starts, I started to lose my footing, I jumped and landed safely in the refreshing water below. Indeed, *God had me*.

Church, you may be standing on the edge of a cliff today or you may be looking at a blank canvas wondering what direction your life is going in next. But just like the mural down here at Chelten and Wayne that depicts different scenes from different times in the life of Germantown, God is working on the next part of the mural of your life. So just remember, He's got you. And maybe, just maybe, if you let Him, He will use his fan brush and paint some new happy little trees into your life too.

HOW IS MY GIFT USED?


A gift to the Peace & Global Witness Offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of injustice across the world. Individual congregations are encouraged to utilize up to 25% of this Offering to connect with the global witness of Christ's peace. Mid councils retain an additional 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The remaining 50% is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.

Your local or mid-council portion of the Peace & Global Witness Offering could be contributed toward to the Freedom Rising fund for African American males.

Gun Violence Prevention

The Mission and Outreach Committee is renewing its commitment to Gun Violence Prevention, and will be talking more about it at their meeting on Sunday, October 28, immediately following worship. Among topics of consideration are joining the Presbyterian Peace Fellowship's call to a lifting up this important issue in worship on Sunday, February 17this is the Sunday following the anniversary of the mass shooting at Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School on February 14, 2018, as well as the day to lift up Students on the Presbyterian Planning Calendar—as well as a rededication to the Heeding God's Call initiative, which the FPCG has been involved with in the past. We will also look at the Gun Violence Prevention Toolkit and other ways we might make a difference on this issue in the world and here in our own community.



Profile from the Pews: Chris Scott

Hi, Chris! Give us a little personal background: family, favorite sport, that sort of thing. Share something people might not know about you that you think is interesting or unique.

I was born and raised in South Philly with both my parents, two brothers and two sisters. My mom is from South Philly and my dad is from Germantown. I always joke with my parents I spent my childhood in my mom's neighborhood and now I have to spend some time in Germantown for my dad. Growing up, my family was backwards in regards to stereotypical norms. I really feel like I got my emotions and sensitive side from my dad. On the flip side, my passion for sports and everything Philadelphia comes from my mom. I can admit now that I was a Cowboys fan growing up but, in my defense, I think I was just attracted to the "star." Today, I am an avid Eagles fan and have had conversations with my mom about how painful it was to buy me Cowboys merchandise as a kid. An interesting thing is I love to play football but I love to coach basketball. For me, football is instinctual but I understand basketball on an intellectual level.

When did you first come to FPCG?

I started attending First Pres in the summer of 2005. I had a couple friends in the handbell choir and they invited me to youth group trips and Sunday School.

What made you stay?

There were a couple reasons I stayed at FPCG. The first reason was the genuine friendships I've formed with members of the congregation even after the youth hand bellchoir disbanded. The second reason was I bought in to the church's commitment to be a church of the community.

What's your favorite FPCG moment?

One of the first sermons I heard Rev. Nancy preach, she referred to Jesus as a chicken. I remember being shocked and a little scared about lightning coming through the ceiling. But she went on to explain how chickens lay over their young when they are in the fields. They do this because the chicken's thick feathers make it virtually impossible for birds and other flying predators to fly down and pick up the baby chickens. Once she explained it, it was funny but I was a little worried there for a moment.

Give a snapshot of some of your strengths and the



ways you've used them at FPCG.

Two strengths that comes to mind are my creative thinking and planning skills. Over the years, I've been a part of so many incredible events at First Pres. It started with the Disciples Basketball team that I coached for 10 years and, now, going into our 3rd meal packing event with *Rise Against Hunger* during Dr. King weekend in January, and the Be the Change fund raiser benefitting Keep A Child Alive.

Give some background on Keep a Child Alive.

I've helped birth or nurture dozens of ideas at First Pres but my baby is the Be the Change fundraiser. I first heard about Keep A Child Alive in 2007 while attending an Alicia Keys concert. From there, I became a monthly donor but I wanted to do more. This feeling gave birth to the Be the Change fund raiser in 2013. Since then, we've have 6 successful events with so much love and support from FPCG. Over the last 6 years, we've raised over \$20,000 for an organization that is dedicated to providing life saving treatment, food, support and overall care to children and families impacted by AIDS/ HIV in Africa and India. One the most moving statistics is in 2017, 167 HIV positive women gave birth at the Alive Medical Services center in Uganda. ZERO babies were born with HIV because their mothers were able to get the medication that was needed to combat the virus.

What excites you most about FPCG today?

I'm most excited about the air of new life that flows through our church. With the different events and mission trips aiding our local neighbors and our international ones, I feel like the First Presbyterian Church in Germantown is getting back to the type of church God wants us to be: a loving, vibrant, inclusive and celebrating church.

NOW IN PRINT

First Church Music Director's setting of Away in a Manger is now in print. The original hymn tune BREMER was composed for the beloved carol text as a farewell gift to Randy and Donna Bremer last year and was first sung by the members of First Church. It was selected for the *Empire State Hymnbook*, a collection of hymns by New York composers published by the Organ Historical Society (OHS). "Modern hymnals abound with hymns by contemporary New York musicians, but we hope with this hymnbook to have brought to light some worthy examples by famous organists of the past two hundred years as well as to have contributed some outstanding newly-composed additions to this ever-growing repertoire," declared hymnbook editor Rollin Smith. Thurman's hymn tune DAY OF DAYS, which originally appeared in Soli Deo Gloria, a collection of hymn texts by Kentucky poet Carolyn Lott Monohan (Louisville, 1992), was also selected for the new OHS publication.


