From the Pastor

Christ is risen! Christ is risen indeed! We shout these words on Easter Sunday morning, and feel the rush of joy for new life – Jesus' and our own in his name. Yet new life comes with a price, and a high one.

A recent issue of Christianity Today had a comic that I will share with you here:



One of the symbols of resurrection is the Butterfly. This is because it is an easily visible metaphor for

urrection is the Butterfly. This is because it is an easily visible metaphor for change: an earthbound caterpillar – the scientific term is larva – becomes a beautiful winged creature we call a butterfly. We know this happens within the confines of a chrysalis or cocoon, but do you know exactly what happens within that protective casing? The caterpillar doesn't just grow wings.

No, the body of the caterpillar totally liquefies, literally releasing enzymes to digest itself into essentially a protein-rich caterpillar soup. Next rapid cell division takes what are around 50 cells and turns them into more than 50,000 by the end of the metamorphosis.

Transformation, true transformation, is hard work. Sometimes we don't want to go through the death necessary to experience new life. We want, like the comic suggests, to act like we're doing the work, while really staying exactly where we are. The thing to remember is that our God is not only with us, but knows exactly how we feel. Jesus, too, cried out for the cup to be taken from him, but ultimately in submitting to God's will, experienced resurrection and offers new life for us all.

As we continue to journey the resurrection road together, we will encounter challenges as individuals and as a community of faith. But if we are willing to submit to God's will through it all, I have no doubt that we will also learn to fly!

Presbyterian Youth Triennium (PYT)

Update:

Registration is still open for Triennium, and we have 8 young people headed to Indiana for Triennium. Zaria Cuffee, Tiffany Daniels, Trinity Daniels, Jasmine Greene, Emanuel Heyer-Rivera, Abrianna Kendrick, Danielle Ohemeng, and Joshua Overton will be traveling with dozens of other students from the Philadelphia Presbytery and thousands of other youth nationwide to worship, study, pray and have fun together July 16-20th.

Fundraising has already begun within our own congregation. This is an important part of the planning and lead up to Triennium. This opportunity comes at a cost. The participant cost for the event is \$555. FPCG is committed to seeing any of our members and active youth group participants be able to attend. We have broken down the cost of the event into three payments of \$185 each. The first portion is paid by the participant and their family. After having received the first portion, our congregation's Christian Education committee has budgeted to pay the second payment of \$185 for each participant. The final \$185 per participant is fundraised by the group. Individual FPCG members have come forward on their own to give partial scholarships to participants headed to this event and we thank God for their help, but there is still a balance to be raised. Again, you who have chosen to sponsor know who you are and we thank God for your unsolicited aid in getting our young people to Triennium.

On April 28th, the final Presbytery of Philadelphia preevent for registered and prospective participants was held at Carmel Presbyterian Church. As of this publication the event had not taken place, but each of the preevents gave young people and their families some elements of the Triennium experience and allowed them to get to know other participants who would be attending this summer.

Please be on the look out for the annual Mother's Day Flower and Bake Sale in coffee hour the next few Sundays. This year's proceeds will go toward helping to lower the cost for each Triennium participant. It should be noted as well that the youth of Triennium are hosting an odd jobs fundraiser throughout the month of May. If you have some general light to medium work you'd like done around the house (leaves raked, prep work for your garden, room walls painted, basement to be reorganized, spring cleaning, etc) our youth might be able to help you for an agreed upon donation prior to the work. Rev. Rebecca will be having Triennium participants under the supervision and leadership of Christian Heyer-Rivera help her put up a privacy fence in the month of May to help raise funds.

Get creative and contact Christian at 267-972-5662 if you have a task you'd like done that doesn't require too much expertise and is safe for 9-12th graders to perform that you're willing to use as a fundraiser, knowing that your contribution will provide an exciting, life supporting and unforgettable experience for our young people to learn and grow in the faith God has given them!

GACM has an education arm called THRIVE. Taking Hold, Reaching In, Vesting Everything! THRIVE programs help GACM fulfill the latter part of our mission Statement, "...to help them (clients) take the next step(s) toward self sufficiency". The THRIVE certificate program began in fall of 2017. It was designed to be is a comprehensive, 20 hour self help experience. There are four modules: All About Me, Health and Wellness, Financial Literacy and Computer 101. 67 participants have enrolled in the program and 41 have graduated. Our fourth cohort graduation was held March 27. Graduation highlights included the keynote speaker, Kevin Porter and a personal testimony from graduate Desiree Reason.

To let you know your work was not in vain, LaSalle Nurses—I set a goal to stop smoking. It took me a while but today is my third day without a cigarette! Also thank you to Jeff Prodraza who taught us about finances. Because of his classes I was able to identify my income and increase my knowledge of my spending. I learned the importance of legal documents and preparing for the future. As a result, I purchased a small life insurance policy. I no longer have to worry about my family having to worry or ask for help when the time comes. My today is better because I have taken care of tomorrow.

Now that I am not smoking, my health will be better, and I have more money. The money I wasted on cigarettes can pay my monthly insurance premium.

Philadelphia Interfaith Hospitality Network

On any night of the year in Philadelphia, an estimated 1,000 to 1,300 children and their families are homeless. <u>http://philashelter.org/</u>

Since its inception in Philadelphia, First Church has opened its doors to house homeless families enrolled in Philadelphia Interfaith Hospitality Network, (IHN) With a focus on "Homelessness Prevention, Housing, Shelter, Services, and Advocacy" IHN provides comprehensive services to families doing the hard work of overcoming the diverse barriers that have led to their homelessness. Often the program is described as a shelter that is not like a shelter. This is because of congregations like FPCG and volunteers like you! Our building is a well-maintained safe space. Volunteers like you are people generous with smiles and a commitment to treat our guests as you would treat yourself.



On April 28th three families including 10 children, moved in to FPCG. Sunday School classrooms became their private rooms. The Primary Room, their gathering space for meals and other communal activities. During their first two weeks here, buddy congregations continue to supply needed volunteers and food. Beginning Sunday, May 12, FPCG takes over providing coverage for the remaining two weeks. Families will move on to the next host congregation Sunday, May 26.

IHN Provides a easy opportunity for you to gives hands on service. Opportunities include:

- Dinner Provider: Dinner provider/ host may cook in the church kitchen or use the facilities to warm food purchased or prepared elsewhere. 6PM
- Evening Hosts: Evening Host assists the dinner host with final meal prep, setting the table and greeting families as they arrive. 6PM
- Overnight Hosts: Overnight Hosts arrive by 8 pm and remain in the building overnight.
- Food Donations: Donations of food items to enable guests to prepare breakfast, lunch and snacks are needed. With so many children, lots of individually packed snacks will be helpful.

What was the "Gang of Four" and where did it go?



A few years ago our Building Manager was Jesse Jacobs. Many of you will remember him. He resigned his position at First Church to spend more time to develop his rental real estate business. I (Lois Bethea) was Chair of Administration and Finance at the time and hoped that we could find a way to manage our building without hiring a full-time replacement for Jesse. I was also in the process of retiring and planned to spend more time at the church as a volunteer. A few days after Jesse's leaving was announced, four of us were in the church office: Pete Smith, Joe Leube, Jim Thompson and myself. The topic of Jesse's replacement came up. We already knew that Terry Boyer was willing to work a few more hours but did not want

to work full time. We also knew that a necessary part of Jesse's job was keeping track of all of the projects, details and "things to do" for the building. The four of us were all retirees and had some extra time. I suggested that we take the responsibility for the "to do list" for the church and work with Terry to support his efforts so that the job could be done in less than full time. As a joke I suggested that we call ourselves "The Gang of Four". Randy Bremer, Head of Staff at the time and Carolyn Ballard Freeman, Chair of Property at the time, agreed to suggest the plan to the Personnel Committee. Terry Boyer became our new Building Manager, part time. "The Gang of Four" was born as a sub-committee of the Property Committee.

The goal was for volunteers to share building responsibilities so that the church would not need another full -time person. That goal was achieved. People left the "Gang", committee chairs changed, volunteers joined the "Gang" and we worked to support Terry in maintaining the building. At first we met every week, then twice a month and recently, once a month or less. Now that the building maintenance is on a more routine path, the gang is disbanding.

Meanwhile, the maintenance of the "to do" list for the Property Chair's benefit needs to continue. The plan going forward is to have Terry Boyer touch base with Marc DiNardo, current Property Chair, before each property committee meeting. I will help Terry with the clerical part of keeping the list up to date. Any volunteers who have time and energy and a heart for property issues are encouraged to attend the Property Committee meeting the third Wednesday of each month.
