**JULY CHALLENGE OFFERING SUNDAY BREAKFAST RESCUE MISSION:**

Founded in 1878, the Sunday Breakfast Rescue Mission, has reached out to the homeless in Philadelphia for more than 130 years. Originally named the Sunday Breakfast Association, its name was changed a few years ago to reflect their expanded services as a Rescue Mission. Rescue Missions are similar to a traditional homeless shelter, but focus on caring for the spiritual needs in addition to the practical needs of people. Sunday Breakfast Rescue Mission, a non-profit organization, exists to minister in the name of Jesus Christ to the physical and spiritual needs of homeless and disadvantaged people in the Philadelphia area. Sunday Breakfast Rescue Mission aims to transform lives by the power of God; so that those who have been loved, rescued and trained would become those who love, rescue and train. Sunday Breakfast Rescue Mission serves the homeless through two locations in Philadelphia: a meal service program serving three meals a day to anyone in need and men's shelter in Center City and a transitional home for women in the Germantown neighborhood of Philadelphia. The Center City shelter also houses a long-term recovery program for men. The Mission does not receive government funding and relies on the generous contributions of caring individuals, families, churches and businesses.

**TRIP TO SMITHVILLE NEW JERSEY:** Smithville, N.J. is located about 15 miles north-inland from Atlantic City. There are brick paths shaded by oak and pine trees and lined by shops and boutiques on each side. Smithville began as a simple stagecoach stop, It is now a welcoming and thriving community. Cobblestone walkways with places to sit and rest, footbridges and beautiful grounds are some of the historic sites the town has to offer. Smithville is a shoppers paradise as it features over 50 shops, a delicious bakery and a winery. The winery offers tastings as well as a wide variety of wines to purchase. A day in the town of Smithville will be a day well spent. The van will leave the church parking lot at 10:00am sharp on July 25, 2019 and will return at approximately 4:00pm.
