From the Pastor

While I was on Continuing Education leave in North Carolina last month, my phone began acting strangely. Admittedly, it was very old – the original battery had died years ago, and I was continuing to limp along by purchasing new ones every 6 months or so. I just didn't want to get a new model and deal with whatever was going to be different with it. But that changed while I was away.



It wasn't just that it wouldn't hold a charge. Other things started going wrong as well. For example, I could receive group texts but couldn't reply to them. Not earth-shattering, but still a pain. Then something happened that I couldn't deal with: my GPS began to wig out. It couldn't find me or would put me a couple of blocks away from where I actually was. It would direct me onto the highway when I was already on the highway or drive me around in circles. Being in a place you've never been before is not the time to have your GPS stop working!

I had no choice. I had to break down and purchase a new phone. So I did. It's basically the same phone with some upgrades, most of which are good and some of which are annoying. But the best thing about the phone is that it has security monitoring. I don't really care about the security monitoring. I mean I guess it's all well and good. What I love is that every single time I open my phone it tells me under the heading AT&T Mobile Security, "Everything is OK."

Everything is OK! What a great reminder in these times when everything does not feel OK at all. Back in March, when we first realized the gravity of the COVID19 pandemic, and began to take action because of it, we had no idea the magnitude of its effect. On our personal lives, our church life, our community. We couldn't have imagined that we would be sheltering in place for going on five months, and still struggling with mitigation. Our lives are upended, and we still don't have answers about when or how it will be safe to be together again. What's going to happen with schools and businesses and yes, church reopening? It is hard not to be anxious and afraid when there is still so much that is unknown.

There is a saying that the Bible tells us to "Fear not" 365 times, once for every day of the year. This is not technically accurate. Depending on the translation, and the wide number of ways one can say "Fear not/Do not be afraid" there are anywhere from 38-314 times this guidance is given. But the point is not how often we are told "do not worry about anything" (Phil. 4:6), but that God is sovereign. God is the one in control. We can lean back on the everlasting arms, and trust that no matter what our circumstances, everything is okay. "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:38-39)

Everything is OK, even when it feels like it's not.

UPDATE FROM THE DAMBMAN'S ATHLETES IN ACTION

We received an update message from the Carl and Noreen Dambman earlier this summer. For more than 40 years Carl and Noreen have devoted their lives to the worldwide ministry of CRU (known in some areas as Campus Crusade for Christ). Our church has faithfully supported their ministry for many years; of late through one of our monthly challenge offerings. This year it will be the September Challenge Offering. Here are some excerpts from their latest newsletter:

Greetings from the Pacific Northwest USA---

"Be still and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." The LORD Almighty is with us; the God of Jacob is our fortress." Psalms 46: 10-11

I have added Work Place and Zoom to Skype, WhatsApp, Telegram and Facebook, so I can connect internationally with sport ministry leaders and friends across the globe. My zoom connections are with 12 years of the International Sports Leadership School (ISLS) classes that were in South Africa 2008-2019 when I served as "shepherd." During those years we have served 280 students (from 109 different countries). Since all travel has ceased, being able to zoom around the world is a wonderful way to encourage our country sports leaders.

I am also skyping or zooming with Eurasia in a partnership with Athletes In Action Russia and Fellowship of Christian Athletes. Church is in our living room on live stream on Sunday mornings with the 7 of us. We are also able to connect via zoom with other church prayer meetings. A challenge of schedule is that the ISLS zoom meetings start early and the Eurasia meetings are late at night.

Please pray that Carl will balance the desire to connect and shepherd sports leaders he knows and quality time with the LORD and family. God is calling us to be more intentional in our prayers and asking we are asking Him to show us those who need our encouragement the most.

I have shed tears as I heard of the difficulties in some of the areas where I know the sports leaders. I am proud of how many are stepping up to let the Light of Christ shine in their communities.

August Challenge Offering:

PAR Recycle Works

PAR Recycles Works is a social enterprise, which means it is operated as a traditional business, but with a strong social purpose and mission. The mission creates a significant amount of "financial friction" that prevents us from being profitable from our recycling revenue alone. PAR currently generates almost 2/3 of their needed total revenue, but depends on the generosity of individuals, organizations, and foundations to cover the shortfall. As a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization, we are able to accept tax-deductible contributions. As a traditional employer, the objective is to stabilize newly returning citizens and help them develop the skills and habits that will make them successful in mainstream, full-time employment. Assistance is needed to make connections with organizations that can serve as employers and benefit from the trained and motivated individuals that come out of our program. Also, waste electronics such as computers, servers, monitors, and printers are the raw materials of our business that enable us to create jobs. You can assist by making introductions and connections to companies that use and replace computers as well as entities that may want to host a community e-Waste collection. 1. LOGGING INTO THE MEETING


You will receive an email invitation to the meeting similar the one below. If you are using a computer, cell phone or tablet, you can click the link in the blue text. This will log you into the meeting. You may or may not be prompted for a passcode.



If you are joining by phone, you will be given a phone number and a Meeting ID. You call the number and when prompted, enter the Meeting ID followed by the # sign.



For most computers and laptops, in the lower left corner, there are two icons "mute/unmute" and "start/stop video." If there is a red slash through either icon, either your microphone is muted or your video is turned off. Just click the icon to turn each one on.


For most tablets, those icons may be in the upper right corner. Don't forget to increase your audio volume if necessary .




How to Use Zoom for the Congregational Meeting continued

4. REACTION ICONS

To use the "clapping" or "Thumbs up" reaction, click on the reaction icon . If you are using a computer, the icons will be at the bottom of the zoom screen. On a tablet, you'll see a "More" icon in the upper right corner, click that to access the reaction icons



To raise your hand on a computer, click on the Participants button located at the bottom of the zoom screen. A popup of all the participants of the zoom call will appear on the right side of the screen. In the lower right corner, you'll have the option to click "raise hand." If you are using a tablet, click the "more" icon in the upper right corner, click "raise hand" to raise your hand. If you have called in by phone, you can raise your hand with *9 on your dialpad.

Grief, Loss, and Bereavement: Some Basics

Although all of us go through grief and loss at some point, the COVID pandemic has thrust the reality of this fact of life into the forefront of our individual and collective experience – whether we have realized it or not. This is true whether we, or those we know and love, have been affected by the disease or not. All of us may be finding ourselves coming to terms with the various degrees of loss of routine, ways of socializing, means of independence, sense of physical safety, or economic security among other things.

Regardless of the type or severity of loss we might be facing, there are insights we may find helpful to our particular situation by familiarizing ourselves with the stages of grief described by Elisabeth Kubler-Ross in her book *On Death and Dying*. In short, Kubler-Ross describes grieving as a process which takes us through the stages of denial, anger, bargaining, depression, and acceptance.

She acknowledges that everyone grieves differently and that the journey is not a straight line or sequential progression. We may find ourselves bouncing between the different stages on any given week, day or even hour! But even knowing these various emotions might be a part of grieving can help us understand why we – or those grieving alongside us – may be feeling or behaving in a particular way.

For example, the two siblings arguing over who gets Mom's mixing bowl may be acting out their anger that Mom has passed away. Likewise, a child who is experiencing the loss of being able to visit friends and family in this time of physical distancing may be feeling anger or depression. When these not-always-apparent grief reactions are experienced in normal times it can be difficult to know what is going on.

Now imagine how fraught this understanding can be when *everyone* is experiencing multiple losses at the same time!

Grief, Loss, and Bereavement Support Group
