# **MISSION UPDATE**

Allison Seed attended a consultation sponsored by the Presbyterian Church (USA), the United Church of Christ, the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), and the Federation of Protestant Churches in Italy on January 21-25, 2024, in Rome. The conference centered on internally and externally displaced persons and migrant and refugee justice. This program included panel presentations and small group activities for future work together. It was held at a hotel run by the Waldensian Church, which is the original Protestant/Reformed church in Italy, dating from the sixteenth century. Allison is transitioning into serving as co-moderator of the Southern Europe Partnership Network, a collection of networks of volunteers with support from PC(USA) mission personnel.

# **MUSIC NEWS**

This month, the FPCG Music Ministry is moving with two seasons: Black History Month (for the whole month of February) and the Season of Lent (starting on February 14). In acknowledgement of Black History Month, the chancel choir will be giving pride of place to Black Composers in its musical offerings, highlighting composers familiar and less familiar, older and contemporary. We will also show a variety of styles including arrangements of spirituals, gospel music, and classical works. Stay tuned for notes in your bulletin with biographical details on some of these artists.

On February 25 at 2pm, we look forward to welcoming Ruth Naomi Floyd, sacred jazz artist, along with her band into the sanctuary for what promises to be a very special concert. This performance is sponsored by Artcinia and is free and open to the public. Please mark your calendar and bring a friend to this event that is not to be missed.

For the Season of Lent, worship will move to a more reflective mode including quieter anthems and service music. In place of the Gloria Patri which we normally sing after the Assurance of Pardon, we will sing a response from the Taizé tradition, a meditative practice from a French monastic community that brings together Protestants and Catholics. Songs from the Taizé Community often involve improvisation and the layering of different texts and melodies. Each week during Lent will be a little bit different.

# **BLACK HISTORY MONTH FEATURE:**

African American Leader, Shelton Bishop Waters



Born in 1918 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to Episcopalian parents, Waters grew up on the north side of the Allegheny. The family attended the Church of the Holy Cross in Homewood, some 10 miles away. His parents named him after the priest at Holy Cross, Shelton Bishop. The young Shelton joined Bidwell Presbyterian Church as a teenager, "to get mixed up with the kids of the community, and the girls." Recommended for ministry at a young age, he attended Lincoln University

and Johnson C. Smith University—his transfer from the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroad to trains headed south for the latter was his first experience sitting in a segregated train car. It was in Charlotte, North Carolina, that Waters got in touch with the century-long legacy of Presbyterian educational work among African Americans in the South, meeting students from the "feeder schools," Presbyterian-run elementary and secondary schools training young people for ministry, industrial, and professional careers. It was his first taste of an all-Black presbytery, and an all-Black synod, and his first time studying under Black faculty.

From 1947 to 1969, he was pastor of First African Presbyterian Church in Philadelphia, leading it into a new church building on Girard Avenue in the Parkside neighborhood, where the congregation hosted Martin Luther King Jr. during his visit to the Presbytery of Philadelphia. During his time at First African, Waters was moderator of the presbytery and the synod. In his telling, his role in the presbytery was simply to make clear that it was not a white fraternity: "Now and then in presbytery, somebody would go up and make some kind of a joke that didn't sound just right. And the time came when I was able to get up and tell them, 'That's not the kind of thing you say here.' You know, we had darky jokes and things like that would come up from time to time. And the time came when they realized they couldn't get away with that anymore—within the presbytery."





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
