

We will also reflect on the act of giving and how it impacts our lives.

Hymnody 101

Why do we sing in church? What does have the Bible have to say about song? How can I find more meaning and enjoyment in singing for worship? In this three part class (Feb 2, Feb 16, and March 2) led by John Walthausen, we examine the rich story of the Church's hymnody, or its tradition of writing and singing songs together. Together, we will learn about the history of congregational song from the Old Testament through the present day, learn techniques to sing our hymns more confidently, and discover how singing together can bring us closer to God and to each other.

The Oratorio Choir is holding rehearsals for Arthur Honegger's *King David*. This composition details the calling, life, and death of King David in a fun and challenging score. Rehearsals are Tuesday evenings at 7:15 PM, beginning on February 25, and the concert will be held on Sunday, April 6th . All singers are welcome to join for this project- no audition is required!



FPCG Choral Scholars Initiative

This Spring, the FPCG music department is pleased to debut an important new program: the FPCG Choral Scholars Initiative. This program, which was made possible by generous bequests from Anna Reimann and J. Randall Rosensteel, is allowing us to bring into the choir up to three high school aged singers to lend their voices and build ensemble singing skills.

Our first scholar, Sahj S. is a senior at Philadelphia High School for Creative and Performing Arts (CAPA) and is joining us in the bass section. Sahj is passionate about music and theater and is pleased to be singing for worship. We look forward to welcoming more young musicians soon.

Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday is on March 5th, and it marks the beginning of Lent, a 40-day period of reflection, repentance and turning to God as we acknowledge our mortality. "Dying to our old self", we begin the journey to being raised with Christ Jesus, and it is symbolized by the imposition of ashes on our foreheads. We will hear the phrase "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Receiving the ashes during the service is a communal act of repentance, turning from sin and moving towards God. Our service will begin at 7 pm in the sanctuary. A soup supper will be served before the service starting at 6 pm. Please plan on attending this meaningful time of worship as we prepare for Lent.

Women's History Month

From the first settlers that came to our shores, from the first American Indian families that befriended them, men and women have worked together to build this nation. Too often the women were unsung and sometimes their contributions went unnoticed. But the achievements, leadership, courage, strength and love of the women who built America was as vital as that of the men whose names we know so well. -President Jimmy Carter

Women's History Month began in 1978 as a week-long celebration in Santa Rosa, CA, and was expanded to a month-long celebration in 1987. The original week was centered around March 8, which is International Women's Day. In 1980, President Carter issued a proclamation declaring March 8 as Women's History Week. In 1981, Congress established the week and, in 1987, Congress passed a resolution officially designating March as Women's History Month. This month honors the achievements and contributions that women have made in all aspects of United States history.



Eleanor Roosevelt

A noted diplomat, politician, humanitarian, activist, and first lady. She was a member of the United Nations General Assembly, and was the chair of the committee who wrote the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Throughout her life, she was appointed to a variety of governmental positions by several different presidents.



Senator Tammy Duckworth, PhD

Born in Bangkok and raised in Honolulu, she is the senator from Illinois and a retired Army National Guard lieutenant colonel. She is a double amputee due to a war injury, and she was the first senator to give birth while holding office.



Rev. Katie Canon

A theologian and ethicist who focused on womanist and black theology, she was the first African-American women ordained in PC(USA).



Alice Walker

A writer and social justice advocate, she is best known for writing *The Color Purple*.



Deb Haaland

A member of the Laguna Pueblo tribe, she was the first indigenous American to serve as a cabinet secretary.



Marsha P. Johnson

She was a leader in the Stonewall Uprisings, an AIDS activist, and the founder of North America's first LGBTQ+ youth shelter.



Mary McLeod Bethune

A Presbyterian, she is credited with creating Sunday School. She advocated for women's rights and for desegregation, and held leadership positions under presidents Coolidge, Hoover, Roosevelt, and Truman.

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has revoked the previous administration's guidance for immigration enforcement. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents can now enter schools, hospitals and churches. ICE can enter public areas without permission which include parking lots, lobbies and other waiting areas. They cannot, however stop, question and arrest anyone who is in a public area. What this means for us is that ICE may enter the church and our fellowship halls, Longstreth, Jennings and Finney. They are not permitted to go into our church offices unless they have a judicial warrant with a specific person's name on it or expressed permission from the pastor and senior staff. Churches may identify the sanctuary and fellowship rooms as private on the six other days of the week and thus deny access to these areas. Below, please find a graphic advising us on how we be document and be witnesses to interactions that are contrary to our Christian mandate of loving our neighbors and caring for those who seek refuge in our country.


