

FPCG and The CLEAR Project

I am writing to share some exciting news about the First Presbyterian Church of Germantown's (FPCG) participation in a unique program. Last year, FPCG was selected as one of thirteen institutions to join Villanova University's CLEAR Project. This initiative, which stands for "Children, Liturgy, Ecology and Renewal," is being represented by Reverend Christian Heyer Rivera and myself, Elder Contina Lee Lundy.

Over the past year, Christian and I have been meeting virtually to delve into readings and learn from experts in the relevant fields. The CLEAR Project, offered by Villanova University's College of Professional Studies, gathers faith leaders from various Christian institutions in our region. Through lectures, discussions, and immersive experiences, we have gained a deeper understanding of the experiences children face today and how these connect with their prayer life, faith, and relationship with the environment. A key component of this program is the development of projects tailored to the children within our own communities.

The CLEAR Project is supported by a generous four-year grant of \$1.25 million from the Lilly Endowment, focusing on the intersection of children, worship, and ecology. This initiative will bring together scholars, including Christian and me, to contribute to these important topics through writing and the commissioning of new music. Furthermore, through classes, site visits, and discussions, the project aims to equip 26 representatives from 13 Philadelphia-area churches and schools to lead new initiatives within their own communities.

This is where Christian and I would greatly appreciate your valuable insights. We are enthusiastic about developing a project that will be truly meaningful and impactful for the young people of FPCG. If you are interested in learning more about the CLEAR Project or have any ideas on how you might be able to contribute to this endeavor, please feel free to reach out to either Christian or myself.





May Challenge Offering

Anesthesiology Training program within Pan-African Academy of Christian Surgeons

It is well-documented that 5 out of 7 billion people in the world lack access to safe, affordable, and timely surgical care. In addition, the greatest areas of unmet need include Sub-Saharan Africa where 9 out of 10 people do not have access to safe surgery and anesthesia. The rate limiting step in providing surgery is often the availability of anesthesia providers and safe anesthesia care. Anesthesiologists are physicians that care directly for patients during surgery and ensure their safety during surgery and other life-threatening illnesses. In ten countries in Africa, there are currently NO physician anesthesiology training programs.

Beginning in July 2018, a group of anesthesiologists from around the world worked to investigate the possibility of starting anesthesiology training under the auspices of the Pan-African Academy of Christian Surgeons (PAACS). PAACS was started in 1996 as a rural-based surgical training program in African Christian hospitals, directed by experienced board-certified surgeons. PAACS partners with established mission and faith-based hospitals to provide training in surgery to African physicians.

I led the Anesthesiology Investigative Task Force which culminated in a presentation at the PAACS Annual Commission meeting outlining the rationale for anesthesiology training within PAACS. The commission voted to accept the proposal and the first group of physician anesthesiologists began training through PAACS in Kijabe Kenya in January 2022. The primary goal is to prepare physicians to practice at the highest level of evidence-based medicine in anesthesiology and to return to their home country to work as anesthesiologists. Additional training is provided in spiritual and leadership development. There are currently 6 African physicians will be added in 2025. The training program takes 4 years and costs approximately \$25,000 USD per physician per year. The ultimate goal is to have graduates of the program assume leadership roles in the training program and to expand this training to other hospitals in Africa.

3. Comprehensive Training The course will cover essential topics, including how to perform CPR, use an Automated External Defibrillator (AED), and administer basic first aid. These skills are invaluable in both everyday scenarios and emergency situations.

This training is open to everyone, but we are encouraging Ushers, Deacons, Elders, Parents, Staff, our Youth and any lay person who has a heart to serve to register.

The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has revoked the previous administration's guidance for immigration enforcement. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents can now enter schools, hospitals and churches. ICE can enter public areas without permission which include parking lots, lobbies and other waiting areas. They cannot, however stop, question and arrest anyone who is in a public area. What this means for us is that ICE may enter the church and our fellowship halls, Longstreth, Jennings and Finney. They are not permitted to go into our church offices unless they have a judicial warrant with a specific person's name on it or expressed permission from the pastor and senior staff. Churches may identify the sanctuary and fellowship rooms as private on the six other days of the week and thus deny access to these areas. Below, please find a graphic advising us on how we be document and be witnesses to interactions that are contrary to our Christian mandate of loving our neighbors and caring for those who seek refuge in our country.

HOW TO RECORD

Record or take photos: You have the right under the First Amendment to document ICE and the police. Do so from a safe distance.

WHAT TO DOCUMENT

- Where the raid happened
- Date and time
- Number of agents
- Type of vehicle used
- Agents' attire
- How they identified themselves

HOW TO REPORT

- It's important that we only share verified reports to avoid causing unnecessary anxiety, panic, or fear in our community.
- Contact JUNTOS to report or verify any suspicious ICE activity.
